

LAND ACKNOWLEDGEMENT

(un)Done is a 40-minute contemporary-burlesque dance performance filled with parody and play. Leaning into the theatrical, the dancers work their ass-ets off!

Traditionally, duets between "male" and "female" bodies are perceived as romantic, (un)Done aims to shift this narrative while confronting the relationship between performer and audience.

Walang Hiya

by Joy Rider

Walang Hiya, a long-form burlesque performance that focuses on Filipina sexuality and integrates traditional Filipino costuming, dance, and theatrics, commissioned by CanAsian Dance and presented by Tangente Dance and Festival Accès Asie.

The Philippines experienced 300 years of Spanish colonial rule, resulting in a restrictive, conservative culture that seeks to control female sexuality. In Walang Hiya, Joy contrasts these constraints and those associated with the reality of living in a racialized and fetishized body in diaspora with the sex-positivity of burlesque. The piece was also presented in Toronto as part of the CanAsian Dance Kickstart.

Most spectacularly, Walang Hiya incorporates the death-defying Filipino folk dance of Tinikling (bamboo pole dancing) into the eroticism of intuitive sensual dance, leaving the audience at the edge of their seats throughout.


Kali: The Original Metal Queen

Pixel Bear is a mixed media exhibition of photography, video and live performance created and performed by Sarah Joy Stoker. The work was generated by Stoker while in the Arctic last year as part of The Arctic Circle Residency for Art and Science, navigating the west coast of Svalbard to reach beyond 80° north latitude, nearing the North Pole. This work is an alert, an alarm, a call for extreme mobilization, a warning, a distress call, an EMERGENCY. The making and showing of this work is an act of action, grieving and hope. It is an absolute rejection of imperial colonialism that has and continues to ravage this world, raging blind capitalism, entitlement, arrogance, and violence. It is an act of and call for the most extreme reverence, the most profound love and the deepest experience of grief and mourning.

Pixel Bear was made possible by participation in The Arctic Circle Residency - for Art and Science, and was supported by the Canada Council for the Arts and Arts NL. Material was created in April, 2023 when Sarah was part of The Arctic Circle – Residency for Art and Science, a self – directed residence sailing aboard the tall ship Antigua. The two-week journey led them to some of the most isolated areas in the high arctic, navigating around the west coast of Svalbard to reach beyond 80° north latitude, nearing the North Pole.

Decoded Dances

An evening of performance featuring solos, duets, and trios from the vibrant repertoire of Nova Dance.

Choreographer Nova Bhattacharya's creations invite audiences on a journey of the imagination through movement, music and colour. Celebrating the transformative power of dance as a ritual of gathering, Decoded Dances features Mel Hart, Neena Jayarajan, Rachana Joshi and Bhattacharya.

Premiering in Corner Brook is Calm Abiding Duet No.1; this 2006 solo for Bhattacharya created by Montreal's José Navas is reconfigured as a duet for dancers aged 25 (Joshi) & 55 (Bhattacharya) in a powerful portrayal of the freedom of form. Maskura, a seminal solo, now performed by multiple dancers exemplifies Bhattacharya's diversiform aesthetic. Broken Lines is an award-winning duet, with two dancers pushing the limits of theatrically and rhythmic complexity. Elemental is a danced ritual of offering to Mother Earth and our environment, it reverberates with poetic elegance and joyous catharsis.



Dancers are encouraged to self-reference movement as they nurture their mind-body connection and sensory awareness in a supportive environment.




WORKSHOP: Movement + Calligraphy
